Lora has been my partner for over 8 years. She hoped and I thought that some day we would officially confirm our deep commitment and love for one another with a formal marriage. Lora's spirit, heart, and love will be missed by everyone that she has encountered. All of her co-workers, all of the farm community, our shareholders, and the farm itself will need to adjust to this change. I imagine that her assistance from the spiritual world, through many different activities, from the bees, to biodynamics, to worker development, and further, in even unexpected places, even beyond our lives here at Angelic Organics, will be a grand blessing. In an effort to free Lora on her journey, we are focusing our efforts on looking at this change as not a loss to us or the community. Instead, we are hoping that by focusing on the love that we have for Lora and the selfless love that Lora has for us, the farm, and for humanity, this transformation will somehow add to our lives.

Obviously, this change will affect us in the near and distant future. There was also a further difficult development as our valued and star employee, Diana Nolden, assistant growing manager, another highly appreciated assistant of mine, was also in this car accident. Diana is doing well on her road to recovery and hopes to be out of the hospital by Wednesday, September 19th (the nurses have named her the "active patient"). Diana will still need to recover from chest injuries she sustained as well as the emotional affects of being in the accident and losing a dear friend. The possible date of her return to the physical field work is not yet known. Please also send your positive thoughts and feelings to Diana.

Because Lora laid out this and the fruit newsletters, you will notice the significant differences to them in the coming weeks. Friends of Lora, friends of the farm, friends of mine, and shareholders and community members, have rallied their support for all of us in this time.
